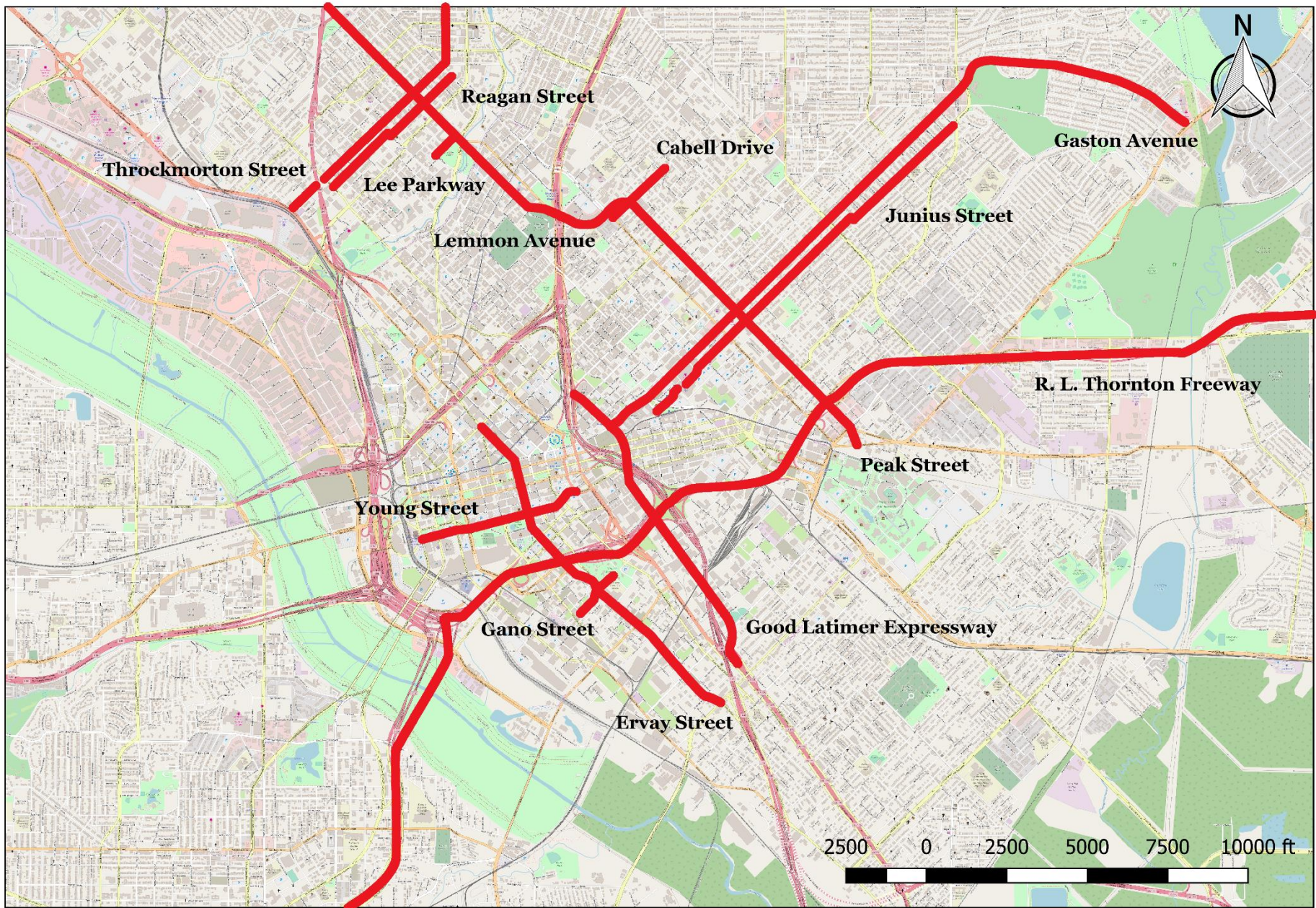


Dallas, TX - Streets Named After a Confederate or Klan Figure

William L. Cabell was a war criminal and the web page has information about the massacre of African American soldiers at Poison Springs.

Ervay Street

Henry Ervay besides being a Confederate he was removed as mayor of Dallas in 1870 for opposing the multi-racial democracy of Reconstruction. Ervay in 1853 was also part of William Walker's invasion of Nicaragua to make it a new state for slavery. He spent his life fighting for white supremacy.

Richard Montgomery Gano was a Confederate General and has neo-Confederate groups named after him.

William Henry Gaston was a Captain in the

Confederate army. After the Civil War there was speculation that his bank was founded with gold he had from his days as a Confederate purchasing agent. (i.e. stolen.) Slave narratives are being assigned address on this avenue.

Jefferson Peak worked to draft men into the Confederate army. After the Civil War he fled to Mexico to set up a Confederate colony under the French puppet emperor Maximillian.
